

Grand Rapids Art Museum pays tribute to another local when it opens A Retrospective of Reyond Weidenaar. A draftsman and printmaker, Rey's works encompass realistic etchings, surreal oils, and watercolors of industrial scenes and landscapes. The display (opening October 25) of more than 100 pieces honors the 100th anniversary of Rey's birth.

Winner of the first ArtPrize in 2009, the wave-scape Open Water No. 24 by Ran Ortner, hangs above the bar at Reserve Wine and Food, where the selection includes more than 100 wines one while nibbling on house-made pâté or a local dairy's chèvre.

beets get pickled, marinated and pureed; Heffron Farms' beef thickens ragu; and Creswick Farms' pork ends up on the grill.

Relationships like this feed the reputation of Grand Rapids' crafts beer scene, too. New Mission Organics on the Leelanau Peninsula grows the hops that inject floral notes in Grand Rapids Brewing Company's tribute to the city's mayor, George Heartwell: Rye-Heart(Well) Bock—one of 17 on tap at the state's only certified-organic brewery. Or grab a pint at the first LEED-certified commercial brewery in the nation, Brewery Vivant. Its Belgian-style beers bear cheeky names like Undertaker in reference to its location in an early-1900s funeral chapel and The team, Grand Rapids Football Club.

Walk back toward the river to CityFlatsHotel, which pleases guests with ecofriendly touches like cork flooring and bamboo linens, and the AAA Four-Diamond hotel Amway Grand Plaza and riverside JW Marriott Grand Rapids promise luxury stays.

Viewers might not recognize many names of artists at ArtPrize, but most will know some of the creators at Frederik Meijer Gardens and Sculpture Park, which celebrated its 20th anniversary in April. Ten minutes from downtown, visitors follow waterways and paths through the 30-acre sculpture park to see 60 major works, including Keith Haring's bright yellow, free-form Julia, Joan Miró's surreal Woman and Bird and Rodin's bronze Eve.









UNEXPECTED BEERS GRAND RAPIDS ISN'T THE ONLY PLACE IN MICHIGAN CETTING CRAFTY WITH ITS BREWS.

Arbor Brewing Company, Ann Arbor This husband-and-wife duo quit their corporate gigs 20 years ago to brew beer. Now, they craft 110 beers with cheeky amusing and surprising ingredients. Their brewpub in India inspired multiple new drafts, including Anahata Chakra Honey Lavender ale.

Atwater Brewery, Detroit When a brewery's slogan is "We drink all we can and sell the rest," its products are worth a taste. A few sips of the Decadent Dark Chocolate ale proves it. The not-too-sweet brew is a drinkable dessert containing three kinds of chocolate.

Bell's Brewery, Kalamazoo Michigan's oldest microbrewery pours 40 drafts at its Eccentric Cafe, where patrons find beers that are typically unavailable outside the pub. The on-tap list changes often and includes less-common brews like Le Contrebassiste, a rustic brown ale.

Cheboygan Brewing Company, Cheboygan

German brewmasters were bringing the beers of their homeland to northern Michigan before the brewery closed in 1911. When it reopened 100 years later, brewers channeled their creativity and the company's heritage to create the Cerman ale Imperial Cinnamon Hefeweizen.

Right Brain Brewery, Traverse City A former barber put down the scissors and picked up the paddle to brew downright startling beers. Culinary-inspired ales are the real attentiongetters. The brown ale Thai Peanut hints at pad Thai with flavors of peanut butter, cilantro and chili peppers.

The Vierling, Marquette A handful of blueberries sit at the bottom of every pint of Blueberry Wheat, the best-selling beer at this 1800s saloon. Slide up to the 100-year-old oak bar to sip on the sweet ale, or drink it down while gazing at Lake Superior through picture windows.
